





#### IN MEMORIAM


Walter E. Kirk, beloved horseman and long time member of the San Mateo County Horsemen's Association, died at home in Redwood City on May 13th. He was 84. On June 8th, a Memorial Service was held at the Mounted Patrol Grounds in Woodside.

In the 1970s Walt joined the SMCHA and in 1982 became a member of the Board of Directors. In 1988 he was elected as Sergeant of Arms and held that position, keeping order at all meetings, until his death. He always helped at the Junior Rodeo by cooking, working the gates and anything else that was asked of him. Last year the Mounted Patrol recognized Walt for all is gracious help. Walt never had kids of his own, but loved to be around everybody elses and was known as "Grandpa Walt" to the little ones.

At the Memorial, many people remembered Walt in a very fond way. Not only did he help the horse clubs, he also helped individuals by offering to feed and care for their horses when they were unable to. He was known to help fix barns, mend fences and participate in work days at Jack Brook. Years ago he invited a young woman on a SMCHA ride and introduced her to a young man whom he had also invited. They both

joined the club, started dating and were eventually married. That young man is our very own current Mayor of Woodside, Dave Tanner. Doug Moody


shared his story about the "Dummy Club" of which Walt was a member and was




up and down the drive way on her horse, Quincy.

#### **SPRING RIDE AT FREMONT OLDER**

For our first ride of 2002 we stepped a bit out of the box, box stall that is. with his wife Cora, owned a portion of the preserve for 60 years. Their house was once a gathering place for personalities of the day and is now listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Thirty members and guests enjoyed a beautiful day and 2-hour ride. I'm happy to report that once again the weather cooperated with us and although it started out a bit cool, there wasn't a spot of rain, and the trails were in great condition. This

#### REINING

"Entry number 99, yer up. 237 on deck, 240 in the hole . . ." says the gate man! Calmly we walk into the arena, my mare and I, such a team bonded with trust and love. Here we go, to the center of the arena.

Four spins to the right . . . four spins to the left—one-two-three—whoa!
Don't overspin! Not to worry.

Begin two large fast

circles to the left, keep her fast, hold that speed, keep the shape of our circle truly round. At the center a small slow circle to the left, then heads up . . . lead change! Like a Ballerina across the floor we've changed our lead to the two large fast circles to the right. Maintaining my shape and speed, and keeping my mare's attention from the cheering whistling crowd outside . . . I downshift to my slow small circle at the center to the right, and then . . . shoulders up, move her hip over and voila—change back to my left lead.

Now we continue around to the left into our wrap-around "cigar-shaped" turn, making sure we don't get less than 20 feet from the rail. Without closing the circle, I gather up, sit back and like a jet building speed on the runway I send my mare down to the other end of the arena, focusing beyond the arena wall ahead of me. Passing the center marker thinking "long" I tell my horse "whoa" and she slides across the ground like a wormy dog. Yahoo!! What a thrill!

Quickly we roll back with a spin over the slide tracks to the right without hesitation. Again I gather my mare, picking her up for balance, preparing for the next run down and stop. Here we go picking up speed, sit back and stop, roll back to the left—YESSS! What a team, may mare and I. Now we set up for our grand finale stop and back up. I lope up around the end lifting our shoulders, rating our speed, my eyes looking far ahead and here we go—down the right side of the arena thinking long . . . go far, go long, and now it feels right and I signal Whoa! The brakes go on, we slide across the ground leaving tracks like a big, long number eleven! Whistles and sheers come from the crowd around me as we gather up for the final back up; she bows her head and we back up 10 feet





to end our exciting performance of Pattern 6 Reining—a most thrilling experience on horseback.

Try it—You'll like it!!




