Denise Eubanks says GABE can do tricks as well as everything else she wants him to do. He still won't clean his own stall, though!


DOC, owned by Rod Armanino just got back from serious training with Lee Racicot over at the Cross Ranch and shouldn't be pulling any more tempertantrums!

Michelle Payne thanks EBONY for helping her win the junior pleasure division in the SMCHA-WEBB RANCH Show Series.


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#### ODE TO A LABOR DAY WEEKEND by Sharon Zall

She rescued her horse from a swarm That was trying to do them both harm. But without fear nor dread She walked in instead And brought Passion home, safe and warm.




The trail rides were some of the best, As I'm sure all of you will attest. Between rock and rill, Meadow and hill, We rode in, all needing a rest.

The day came when we had to go. So with lots of pep and grease of elbow, We broke down each tent, Got up and went, And drove off, going real slow.


The weekend we all spent together. Good friends, in all kinds of weather. Between boulders and bees And gashes in knees,











## TRAIL TIPS-

Reports are that the trails are in pretty good shape within the towns and parks. The vegetation has been cut back, the trail treads are solid, and the bridges are strong and will support an animal.

We are still getting reports of trail user conflicts. Reports should be made of any incident to Ron Harris at 365-0704 as he is compiling a list for possible presentation to the Parks and Recreation Department and Board of Supervisors. It is recognized that the Park Department is receiving limited funding from the county budget reducing their ability to employ o large number of rangers for policing the trails. The Park Department is very highly complimentary of the Volunteer Horse Patrol (lovingly called the County Mounties) as they are extremely visible on the trails and are approaching violators with brochures and information on trail use. The word is getting out that trail etiquette is necessary between the trail users for compatible use of the trails. Also they are informing bicyclists that they are not allowed in county parks except on designated trails and paved roads within the park. It is sincerely hoped that continued educations of trail users will be effective. Please recognize that the Volunteer Horse Patrol are eyes and ears and informers only. They are not enforcement officers. San Mateo County Horsemen's Association is extremely proud of the work that they are doing. Most of the volunteers are members of the SMCHA.

The San Mateo County Trails Advisory Committee was re-appointed by the Parks and Recreation Commission to continue their splendid work. They have been meeting monthly for the past two years and are an extremely active and informed group of volunteers who can do much to promote and implement a wonderful trail system throughout the entire county. Their first meeting under their re-appointment is Tuesday, October 24th at which time their agenda will include a discussion of the county trail plan and a review of their charge and the future work of the committee. Several members of SMCHA are members of this committee.

For the past 5 years, the Midpeninsula Trails Council renamed the West Bay Trails Council has been meeting regularly to promote trails in San Mateo and Santa Clara Counties with some emphasis on Midpeninsula Open Space District. The feeling presently is the Open Space District is highly cognizant of the need and usage of trails in their various preserves and that their use and management plans for each preserve includes adequate trail planning. The Trails Council feels that they have accomplished on of their main goals in this regard. Attendance and membership has dropped off during the past year so he Trails Council is being discontinued and is being incorporated as a Trail Advocacy Committee of the Trails Center. Assets of the Trails Council are being turned over to the Trail Center to be used to support the cost of a trails news report in the regular bulletins and reports of the Trail Center. The Trail Center is doing a wonderful job and transferring the energies f the Trails Council to the Trail Center should make that organization more effective. I urge SMCHA to strongly support to Trail Center and urge each individual member of SMCHA to become a dues paying member of the Trail Center. Dues are \$20 per year and the money is well spent for their mailings which are constantly getting more expensive.


Midpeninsula Regional Open Space District in their fall Open Space newsletter reports that their "showcase" Skyline Ridge Preserve is becoming a reality. New access, tunnel under Alpine Road to connect to Russian Ridge Preserve and it's trails,


more trails, etc. They report that Purisima Creek Redwoods Open Space Preserve (across Skyline form Huddart Park) is now ready for visitors with trails and parking and whole access trails. MPROSD has not yet finalized their Trail Use Policies and Guideline. Copies of the report under consideration and notice of the dates of future public hearing can be had by phoning 949-5500. It is suggested that each horseman obtain a copy of the reports and for individuals to write a letter to MPROSD concerning their reactions. The letters will carry a lot of weight in guiding their final decision.

The State of California Recreational Trails Committee meets quarterly. Minutes of their August 11th meeting indicate that they discussed among other agenda items state park system projects, Santa Cruz staging area to Henry Cowell Park, coast bike route, Bay Area Ridge Trail, adopt a beach plan and a prolonged discussion of the mountain bike policy. a listing of the visitors attending shows that the various bike committees and organizations are extremely active in attending their meetings on a regular basis. The agenda for their October meeting includes again the mountain bike policy update. Horsemen should be more active in attending their meetings.

The Bay Area Ridge Trail continues to open and dedicate portions of the 400 mile system. The latest is the ceremonies held on October 14th on Sweeney Ridge at the Bay Discovery Site. Attendees included horsemen, bikers, hikers, Golden Gate Recreational Area personnel and officials and city and county officials. 2.2 miles on Sweeney Ridge and .8 miles of Milagra Ridge were dedicated. This may seem like a very small section but it is a slow process to get the various jurisdictions to take over the responsibility for this magnificent trail through their particular area. This section will be supervised and maintained by GGNRA. The San Mateo County Bay Area Ridge Trail Committee continues to meet monthly to study and implement the portion of this trail through San Mateo County. They are doing a good job.

As I re-read this report I am highly impressed by the strength and devotion and numbers of volunteers working so mightily to constantly improve recreational trails and their enjoyment by various users. SMCHA recognized the contributions made by so many volunteers.







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
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
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# VOLUNTEER HORSE PATROL

MEET THE VOLUNTEER TRAINERS

The Volunteer Horse Patrol is very fortunate to have professional-level trainers for the evaluation rides. Good safe teams of horse and rider are the very backbone of the program. Cheryl Chandler and Pat Holmes contribute additional time, over and above their patrol rides, to ride with trainees and qualify them and their horses as County Mounties. Their special contribution brings quality and credibility to the program because good horsemanship is vital to the success of the Horse Patrol. Cheryl and Pat, working together with conscientious riders and their mounts, have made the Patrol the success that it is today. Here are their stories.

As a native Californian, CHERYL CHANDLER has enjoyed living in the Bay Area for over 10 years. She started riding and equestrian activities at the early age of two when her mother put her on the back of a pony at the "Ranch" in Idaho that her grandparents own. It was, and still is, a working dude and cattle ranch with 1500 acres. Cheryl and her brothers spent their summers there helping work the cattle.

During her college days, Cheryl always had a saddle horse. To help support those expenses, she worked at the local race tracks walking hot horses before going to school. After receiving a BA degree in Physical Ed, Cheryl taught high school PE, specializing as swimming coach. After two years, her love of horses drew her back to the race track in the early 70's. While at the race tracks of Southern California (Hollywood Park, Santa Anita and Del Mar), she worked as a hot walker, groom, assistant trainer, pony girl, and trainer. At the same time she worked thoroughbred auctions in California, Washington, Arizona, and Kentucky.

After moving to the Bay Area, Cheryl married an equine veterinarian, and for several years assisted him in his practice, which also gave her valuable experience with all types and breeds of horses.

Cheryl is currently a member of the San Mateo County Volunteer Horse Patrol, San Mateo County Horseman's Association, and Los Viajeros riding club. In addition to exercising horses, she owns and operates "Custom Covers by C.C." Specialties are blankets, shipping boots, fly bonnets, saddle bags, and just about anything that the equestrian may need.

Cheryl's four-legged sidekick and former pony horse is Snowball. He is 21 now and has been with her for 19 years. They can be seen on the trails quite often, so if you see a white horse with grey tick markings and a long white tail, say "Hi!" Happy Trails

PAT HOLMES started her horse career a little over thirty years ago (at a very young age). The first years were filled with trail rides, gymkhanas and 4-H club. High school brought work at Hunter stables and a saddle horse (American Saddlebred) barn. These experiences provided the necessary skills for a lifetime of horse-related work.

Pat showed Hackney ponies for Unicorn Farm in Salem, Oregon during college and rode hunters for Col. Alex Sysin of Stanford Stables. She later showed Hackneys and Saddlebreds for various owners and taught hunt seat and saddleseat equitation to dozens of young students. In 1972 Mrs. Swinerton of Woodside and Marysville entrusted the training and sales of her Welsh pony farm to Pat. Many successes followed, among them numerous National Champions and sales all over the United States.

The last few years have seen Pat less at shows as an exhibitor and more as a judge, traveling throughout the country to adjudicate at various events. Training is still an everyday vocation as well as running the boarding stables at Wunderlich Park. Pat now owns Welsh Cobs (imported from Wales) and pursues driving and riding activities with them.

Having successfully shown many breeds in many disciplines (hunters, dressage, saddle horses, driving, ponies, etc.), Pat's experience is vast and varied. When all is said and done, her favorite horse activity has always been trail riding on a sensible horse.

#### OFF TO THE RACES WE WENT!


















Highlights of the 35th Tevis Cup 100 Mile Ride: The winning time was 16 hours, 3 minutes and won by Lari Shea of Fort Bragg on Sur Sherif. Out of 188 starting, 118 finished. Old Timers: Hal Hall, winning his 15th buckle in 17 starts, Julie Suhr of Santa Cruz, a 65 year old grandmother, veteran of 25 Tevis Cup rides, won her 19th buckle, and is already planning to ride for her 20th next year. She came in 15th place, despite riding nearly the whole way on a badly sprained ankle, which forced her to slow down considerable. Rider came from Tasmania, Australia and France to compete. The Haggin Cup award given to the best conditioned horse to finish was not awarded this year. Dr. Hank Cook, DVM is still there after 25+ years, his 65 year old hands gliding over each horse by rote. He times the horses' pulse and listens to gut sounds with his stethoscope. Quoting the Dr., "There are certain criteria the horses have to

meet before the can go on, their capillary capacity, the color of their mucous, pulse and respiration." We them have them trot out to make sure they are sound to go on. Local winners of this year's Tevis were Dick Mesak's son Richard and Kathy Martis.

Congratulations to Mary Hydorn for winning the highest number of points during the Mounted Patrol Playday and was presented with a beautiful silver buckle. Dick and Melissa Convery, Marv and Mary Lee Twisselman, and Sue Machado all won awards. Doug Moody was Judge of the Day and was given a lovely headstall.




