# Minutes

He felt that as long as we had decided not to operate a concession this year, that someone with the authority should let them know. Bill Callahan made a motion that a letter be written to the P.C.A. informing them of our decision. The motion was seconded by George Siegfried and so moved.

Eddie Castleman announced that our entertainment chairman for last month, Libby Marvin, made \$27.00 and also brought in 15 new members. The next meeting's entertainment is to be arranged by Skid and Sylvia Fischer and Marie

Kemm.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.



## CONVENTION RESERVATIONS

THE TIME HAS COME to make reservations for the California State Horsemen's Association Convention at Petaluma — October 8, 9, 11 and 12.

The accommodations available in and around Petaluma do not meet with the requirements usually desired by the members of the Association. So it was necessary to make reservations in Santa Rosa. The distance from the fairgrounds is fifteen miles by either Highway 101 or by Petaluma Hill Road which can be reached without traveling through town or on Highway 101.

Thirty rooms have been reserved at the El Rancho Santa Rosa Motor Lodge. This Motel originally consisted of three buildings forming a U with a swimming pool and cabana in the center. An additional three buildings also in U shape have just been completed in the rear, away from the Highway. This latter group of buildings consisting of twenty four accommodations has been reserved in its entirety, as well as six rooms in the front section.

The rooms are beautifully appointed, Every bed is double-bed size, even in twin-bed rooms.

It may be a problem to fill reservations for the De luxe Bedrooms, so bring the children or double up with some friends or family. If these rooms can be reserved, the entire rear section of the Motel will be taken by members of the SMCHA. (Remember Palm Springs.)


