BITS OF INTEREST

AS TOLD TO ALFREDA PEABODY

E. B. (Dane) Sorensen has purchased a nice going mare from Al Cryer. He has always been a person who likes a good looking horse and a well trained one. On the famous Sonoma Trail Blazer's five day ride with 240 horses, the mare proved herself with flying colors. Al, do you have more in the barn like this one?

Dr. T. D. Harris, the local veterinarian, who came away from his army training at Fort Riley liking hunters, has taken on a big job for a busy person. Already he has constructed the nucleus of an outside hunter course on the rolling country just west of the Ruth Woolsey Unicorn Farm Stables. Maybe before the year is out, many of us among the somewhat older timers who remember when the Gymkhana Club used this same area in 1940, again will see an outstanding hunter trail. In the meantime, the good doctor is trying to divide his meager lot of spare time between building a trappy hunter course and training his new mare to jump and carry on between normal cross country obstacles.

Most of the horse lovers we have known have thought of 20th Avenue in San Mateo as a place where some good horses of many types were stabled and there were excellent facilities to promote the horse sport. That situation still holds good at this location. The Walter Johnson Stable is carrying on with great activity despite the fact that the influx in the area of Elks, Pacific Telephone personnel and several construction crews, are crowding everybody more than somewhat. However, a new high fence to the east keeps the Exalted Elks in their own corral and, so far, Walter has not had to teach a change of diagonals to any self-respecting stray bull Elks. Enough for that. The fact is that the Johnson Stable had a junior show in May that developed a whopping number of entries - 105 to be exact. This turnout was so encouraging that another big Junior show is being held on July 18th and an open show is planned for early fall.

James M. Glaser, head of local Region #10, and enthusiasts in four California cities have been doing a wonderful job to recruit the best riding talent and secure the best in horse flesh in this section for future International competition. Four areas, namely Pebble Beach, Concord, Santa Cruz and Santa Barbara, have done themselves proud in putting on such outstanding two day modified Olympic contests. Points scored by the top riders in all three phases of this grueling test will qualify themselves to go east in the fall and compete for the United States team that will represent us in world competition at Mexico City in March of next year. Some of the Peninsula riders who have entered all or part of the three phases of this competition are Richard Decker, Wally Nall, Dr. Robert Lawson, Mrs. Franklin Downton, Joyce Downton, Mary Browne, Sam Register and William Engman.

Feet- feet- feet. They are so important, no matter what style you prefer to ride. If you are that very unusual person, a good rider, despite poor position of your feet, you may easily become a champion with some attention paid to improving your feet. Never forget the old saying "Poor feet cause poor seat, poor seat causes poor hands, poor hands, and no rider." To increase your interest in the next equitation class, pick out early six riders with the best feet and keep a record of how many of them are in the final workout for the ribbons.

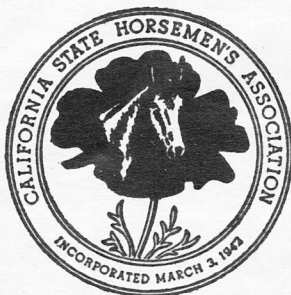


