



April 27th offered us another pleasant evening at NCEFT! Thankfully, Old Man Weather agreed to give us a reprieve from the prior few weeks of rain, allowing for clear Spring skies for SMCHA's Trailering Talk. NCEFT again graciously hosted our presentation in the outdoor arena.

I'd like to give a HUGE thank you to Casey Terribilini for his time and expertise! Casey is a veteran leader of MSAR (San Mateo County's Mounted Search & Rescue - www.smcmsar. org) and past Captain of the San Mateo County Mounted Patrol. He has had several years experience in hauling his own horses in various style rigs, hosted trailer classes for MSAR, and has received training in Large Animal Rescue. Casey not only entertained us with his charisma and enthusiasm, he provided a lot of useful information for both veteran and novice horse-haulers alike.


Using both a bumper pull slant, and a gooseneck with living quarters as examples, Casey reviewed safety basics for both rigs, pointing out items so easy to overlook like a dead trailer battery, sun damaged tires, faulty spare tire, or rotting floor boards. He also provided a great outline to review prior to hauling your trailer

(attached for reference – great document to keep in your trailer for review!).

Even for those of us who have hauled trailers for years, this demonstration was a fantastic refresher of the basics, and challenged us on how well prepared we really are vs. how prepared we THINK we are! As always, SMCHA member in attendance participated with enthusiasm in the question/ answer portion. Some of the questions from the crowd, and shared stories offered up, really demonstrated how precious our Horse Cargo really is. And? What a great reminder of how important we, as Horse Enthusiasts, must consider our job in keeping our equine friends safe on the road.

The feedback and emails received after the evening presentation were fantastic! Folks really did leave feeling they had learned something, which is after all, the whole point!! Thanks to all who attended and to Lyndall Erb for making the haul over & the use of her trailer!



The Tozi Fund

How many of you remember Donna Tozi? She was my best friend for almost thirty years. Donna was one of the first people I met when I moved to Woodside many years ago.

Donna was a devoted horsewoman from the time she was a teen when she became a Junior member of the San Mateo County Horsemen's Association in 1954. In 1996 she served as SMCHA president.

Throughout her life she loved Paint Horses and was a participant in horse shows and rodeos. As owner of B&D Tack, she spent many weekends setting up shop at rodeos and horse shows. She was a financial and enthusiastic sponsor for many cowboys, cowgirls and show events. Donna loved to have fun and always seemed to provide lots of it. She rode her paint horses on our local trails and greeted other riders with a big "Howdy."

Donna passed away in January 2005 from a three-year battle with ovarian cancer. Her request before she died was that donations in her name be made to SMCHA Juniors. A scholarship fund was set up to be used just for the Juniors. So far, two Juniors have received riding lesson scholarships and one is going to a clinic with her horse in July.

The main reason I am writing about this now is let people know that they can still donate money to this fund, which will be used to sponsor Juniors only. All Junior members may apply to the SMCHA Board of Directors by submitting a request for sponsorship for horse related activities. I know Donna would love to see this fund go on for a long time and used often.

I REALLY LOVE MUSTANGS!

Hey Everyone! I'm Corey Pierce, the 11-year-old SMCHA member who loves Mustangs and is fostering the wild Mustang filly named Penny.

I want to say HUGE thanks to the Board for the SMCHA grant and all who have sent cards, emails and donations to help me help Mustangs. Here's a bit about our progress since my talk at the April Meeting (plus a little background for those don't know about my 'Mustangs are America' project):

Last September, I had an accident while jumping my leased Mustang and got a severe concussion that forced me to be home-schooled and stop riding until all the symptoms clear up.

Then, a week after my accident, my Dad was hit by a car while riding his bike on Edgewood Road. The 40 mph impact doublefractured his neck. That was very scary, because the doctors said those fractures usually paralyze or kill, but he's almost 100% now! Both my parents are Pastors and the doctors and our family believe his recovery is a miracle.

Still, it's been a very hard year for my family. It's been hard for me to give up school with my friends and to stop riding, and see my Dad so badly hurt with a neck brace with stitches all over his face.

I was becoming really depressed when I got a very special Birthday present...to foster a Mustang Foal!

In early December a cute strawberry roan arrived at Dwight and Joy Sommerset's barn in Portola Valley.

It was fun seeing how really wild Mustang foals are. Their quick actions and sudden panics scared me. Then for Christmas another wonderful gift: SMCHA member, Becky Witter, offered to coach me in Parelli Natural Horsemanship.

By learning Parelli my confidence level started growing. Soon, I wasn't scared anymore and I'm learning so much.

Then, Becky had this crazy idea! She found out that Pat and Linda Parelli are putting on a Wild Horse Taming Clinic in Reno Nevada the last weekend of July and thought that we should show people how an 11-year-old and a Mustang filly take to Natural Horsemanship... in front of thousands of people! Even though we thought she was a little crazy? -- we trusted her since she'd become our Alpha Mare!!

So, I wrote them a letter and guess what? They invited us to do a demonstration in Reno!!!

Since then we've all been working hard! It's a lot of work to get Penny trained and try to raise 3,500 dollars to pay all the expenses of keeping her for six months and traveling to Reno.

I've learned so much, more than I could ever tell you in one

article! I've learned to do a website, speak in front of people, raise money, create a logo, make and sell my own products, gather a 'Herd' of supporters, open a bank account, track money, do a YouTube slideshow and blog, write articles, plus create a demo (to honor Wild Horse Annie and the 40th anniversary of the Wild Horse and Burro Act.

And, all you horse owners can imagine how challenging (but fun!) it's been to train a young, wild Mustang filly! It's SO amazing 'cuz she's not the scared, wild foal she was when she arrived! In January, we could barely get near her without her running away bucking and kicking. Now, she runs TO me!

I play with her online and at liberty and teach her not be afraid of balls, or dogs or anything loud or moving. She stands quietly when tied, loves being groomed, lifts all her feet nicely, takes treats politely, waits for permission to graze, walks over tarps...and she trailer loads on her own! She's smart, exuberant and playful – and really loves people now! Given my situation when I got her, I really believe God sent Penny from Heaven to help me heal and grow. The sadness and depression are gone, so it's really changed my life!

Kind of like my hard time, Mustangs are having a hard time now due to budget cuts, so we've decided to give everything above expenses to organizations that support Mustangs.

I want to invite all of you who can come to Reno to join us July 29 – 31 at Pat Parelli's Wild Mustang Taming Event!! We are hoping to make SMCHA and all our supporters proud and make Penny such a good horse that someone will adopt



her to love as their very own. I'm hoping she will be adopted locally so I can visit her, but she may end up far away in Reno if we don't find a home before the Event.



GARI MERENDINO: USING THE HEALING POWER OF HORSES TO IMPROVE PEOPLE'S LIVES

Sometimes mysteries get solved when you're least expecting it. People who walk along Vine St. in the University Heights neighborhood in Menlo Park have undoubtedly noticed sculpture scattered amidst the plants. Who is the artist and how did they get there? The answer is Gari Merendino, who's lived there for 27 years — and, we would learn, is something of a jack of many trades.

"It's a great little neighborhood and it was a wonderful place to raise kids," he said, sitting on the spacious second floor of the barn at the National Center for Equine Facilitated Therapy in Woodside, where he's Executive Director. "When we moved in, there were tons of families with kids our kids

age. Now we're seeing the next generation of families, carrying on neighborhood traditions like the summer Friday Frolics."

How the part-time sculptor and former retail executive — he worked for both Levi Strauss and Mervyn's — finds himself running a non-profit that involves horses is a mini mystery of another sort. Like many in the economic downturn that followed the dotcom bust, Gari found himself unemployed. Finding that he could only do so much job hunting in one day, he started volunteering at NCEFT. When he found other employment, he continued to volunteer.

"I'd gotten introduced to horses when I was in my 20s and liked them, and the idea of helping kids be safe on horseback appealed to me," he said. "So I started to volunteer and immediately found it really fulfilling."

The non-profit NCEFT, which Gari joined as a full-time employee in 2008, is celebrating its 40th anniversary this year. The organization helps children and adults with special needs move beyond their boundaries through the healing power of horses. Riders improve their balance, posture, mobility, coordination, and strength on horseback. For those unable to sit astride a horse, carriage driving is utilized, so they still get the sensation of having a pair of reins in their hands.


While NCEFT now has special programs for military veterans as well as developmentally disabled adults, children make up about 90 percent of its clients. "We aren't just treating the kid, we're treating the family," said Gari. "A child with special needs requires care 24/7. So when the caregivers come here, they can relax and read a book while the child is riding. If there are siblings along, they can go pet the donkeys. Our goal is to create an environment where they whole family gets treated."

"As most of you are aware, I have the distinct privilege of serving on both the SMCHA and NCEFT boards. As such I have grown to know Gari Merendino very well over the years. His devotion to the community both as a community leader, horse aficionado, non-profit guru, and a friend to all must be highly applauded. He has had to endure much, but has never wavered in his goal to assist those who are less fortunate and have special needs, as well as our injured armed forces soldiers. We are truly lucky to have Gari champion our projects and stand beside us at SMCHA in our efforts to better the

equine community and make all aware of the need to have animals available for therapeutic treatment.

And a real success it was. With approximately 160 participants, this year's event was one of the best attended Poker Rides in years - and that's without horses! Approximately \$17,000 was raised. All of which will go directly towards supporting all NCEFT programs. The event was supported by over 50 volunteers from all over the community. With so many participants from all over the community - horse-related or not - had this year's event take on an inclusive fell for the surrounding community.

For many years, SMCHA has been the proud recipient of the Poker Ride Challenge trophy as the organization that raised the most donations. This year we were knocked off our perch by Monterey Bay Equestrians. SMCHA came in second place. So, my fellow SMCHA members, let's be sure to increase our riders and the donations we raise at the Poker Ride 2012 so we can have this trophy return to us - where it belongs! 

BETTE JO MACLELLAN NOVEMBER 12, 1936 - MAY 17, 2011

To know Bette Jo MacLellan, affectionately known as our "BJ", was to have known a true friend, and a vivacious lady who always shared a bright smile, and held a positive, gracious personality, no matter what the challenge.

One would never guess that the classy little lady we knew once tied a pesky neighborhood boy who irritated her a little too much one day, to a tree before continuing along on to school, leaving him captive! Although always a bright, eager student, she was often grounded as a youngster for such antics. BJ was the eldest of 3 sisters, and the daughter of a pediatrician whose Navy medical assignment finally settled the family in Spokane in 1943. Before entering the world of horses later in life, she enjoyed waterskiing, hiking, swimming, and was a competitive diver. Throughout her life, BJ was the quintessential outdoor enthusiast.

BJ attended the University of Washington in Seattle, where she was not only a Beauty Queen for some of the fraternities, but also posed for Marlboro magazine ads. After graduating college, she went on to become an O.R. Nurse, changing her career a year later for work as a Flight Attendant for Northwest Airlines and then Western Airlines. Her final career change would happen after she passed her exams to become a CPA and settle in with the Lieberman Family as a Controller; first working for Richard until his death, then continuing on with his son Michael until her retirement in 2010.

BJ, divorced, never had children of her own. As a result, her love was shared with various dogs and cats throughout the years, and finally on to her greatest love, horses. She began as a pleasure rider before entering and competing in the world of Cutting. Tachita's Cat, a horse she purchased as a 2 year old, had many achievements during his career. "Cheeta" won the National Cutting Horse Assoc. World Champion \$3,000 Novice Open Class in 2006. He went on to win the \$3,000 Novice Open Championship for the Pacific Coast Cutting Horse Association, and was chosen 'Horse of the Year', winning BJ a beautiful trophy saddle and buckle in 2007.

BJ also competed with her horse Lotsa, winning her even more trophy's and buckles, though her biggest reward came in the form of Lotsa's filly, "Peanut". Petite and feminine, just like BJ, the flashy Golden Palomino would be Bj's riding partner for the rest of her life. A true Cowgirl, BJ rode Peanut for the last time only a few weeks prior to her passing. When not with Peanut, her little dog Barney was her faithful companion. BJ was an enthusiastic member of the NCHA, PCCHA, The Shack, Los Viajeros, and SMCHA.





Though diagnosed with cancer in 2007, BJ never let it affect her life, thoughts, or behavior. It would be untrue to say she was 'beaten by cancer'. Cancer did not 'beat' BJ, she truly beat cancer. BJ would never let cancer be the topic of discussion. Her most precious example of a full life was to continue to live exuberantly and speak of life and the future. While so many may toil over their illness or question 'why me', BJ never took pity upon herself, as she simply continued to choose happiness and gratefulness for all she had accomplished and experienced during her life. Truly a graceful woman, with only love to share with those around her, Bette Jo MacLellan was a beautiful lady, inside and out. May we all learn her lesson and choose to rejoice in life, no matter the situations we face. Rest in Peace my Dear Friend...I know we'll meet on the Trail again someday....

THE DREAM OF ALL-WEATHER TRAILS IN WUNDERLICH PARK IS COMING TRUE

All this winter, during the rainy days and sunny days, equestrians, pedestrians and runners have been enjoying the beautiful smooth footing of the new All-Weather Trails in Huddart Park. Over the last two years, the equestrian community donated \$83,000 to support construction of 5.5 miles in Huddart Park. The success and enthusiasm encouraged us to develop a plan to build All Weather Trails in Wunderlich Park and continue to fulfill that dream

Phase 1 is done. We were able to finish this 1.37 miles phase the end of May, thanks to the generosity of the equestrian community who donated \$18,450 and the County's contribution of \$7,950 in-kind services and base rock. The trails will be compacted over the summer and remain open next winter. This has created two Lower Loops.

- Bear Gulch Trail, from the Barn to the Loop Trail The slippery mud holes are gone.
- Bear Gulch Trail, from the Loop Trail to the Madrone Trail
- This is a new loop for winter riding.
- Alambique Trail Barn to Loop Trail. There is a now a new loop with the Loop Trail.


We need to have the funds for Phase 2 by Sept 30. Any additional funds will be used for future trail maintenance and improvements in Huddart and Wunderlich.

This will provide several upper loops. The trails will be allowed to settle in for the winter 2011/2012, and will then be open all year after that. The total length is 1.95 miles and will cost approximately \$36,150. The County will provide \$11,250 of in-kind services and purchase of the base rock. The equestrian community must provide the remaining \$24,900.


