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The Amateur Horse and Pony Show

This show was run as a benefit for the Peninsula Humane Society and it was with great pleasure that the following Tuesday, we were able to give the Board of Directors of the Society, a check in the amount of \$1,200.00, to be used to care for horses who are found in trouble. This check was made possible through the cooperative efforts and donations from the San Mateo County Horsemen's Association and the Mounted Patrol of San Mateo County.

Saturday started out on a nice note with the first class in the ring on the dot of the starting time, 8:30 A.M. This was due to a band of "old pros" - PAT GRADY and DICK TEPPER with the help of DAN and MIKE GRADY and PLUG, who had the jumps all set up the night before. ART COLADARCI, ably assisted by his lovely wife, JANE, BUD ALDIGE, and EDDIE CASTLEMAN had the mikes ready to use... DALE RYMAN was at the back gate and Judge GIA ABLE, was at her station in the ring to see the first rider enter.

MOTHER NATURE was there with her splendacious five-foot-long sandwiches to be bought by the inch, if you wished, and her tasty bags of fresh fruit and never to be forgotten carrots for the horses. EMIL and JUDY MAGRIN set up the beer stand but spent a rather lonely day as it was not a very beery crowd or weather. The Peninsula Humane Society lent us some attractive volunteers to take donations at the gate and to sell raffle tickets for the ETCHING of the Thoroughbred donated by artist D. KUNIC.

The jumper classes were well filled and ended with the exciting Gambler's Choice class and a well-deserved win by SUSAN DORSEY on Woodchopper. Only one incident marred the morning's performance—that being the case of a chestnut mare who reared over backwards, giving herself a very sore bottom. Dr. FRANK SANTOS was prompt in arriving on the scene and

diagnosing the trouble.

The afternoon session began with the Costume Class, which almost panicked the judge... the entries were so good. She said to me, "What on earth am I to do now?" but I told her not to worry that she could give more than one blue ribbon if she felt it was deserved. So, SOCKS, all done up like a sheep with KATHLEEN WALKER as his pretty shepherd, and NICKY NICADEMUS in his bathing costume with KIRSTEN KELLY as his swimming partner tied for the first place, and we only wish they could have come back on SUNDAY to show the Western world what they missed.

PAT HOLMES did an excellent job judging the ponies on both days; however, there being few Western ponies, in the future, all ponies will be shown on one day only. We had trouble with loose dogs on both days, not those of the participants but those of the neighbors. They are allowed to run free and this is dangerous. Not only do they get in the ring during performances, but we had dog fights. Finally, on Sunday, we had to call the Humane Society truck after many complaints from exhibitors. We hope a rider doesn't get hurt as a result of this uncooperative attitude. When everyone had left on Saturday except PAT GRADY and myself, a young girl came up the Mounted Patrol Driveway with a dog in her arms and I thought with horror that he had been hit by a car on Kings Mountain Road. The truth was, the girl had been trying to ride home on her bike and the dog kept biting at her tires — this was one of the dogs who had been hanging around both days.

Sunday, DEBBIE BUGGE showed up for her judging stint looking so neat and chic that she should have been in a fashion show. The Western Classes were not as well-filled as the English, but nearly all the riders and horses were immaculately turned out — a lovely sight.

At Noon, the Sheriffs and their German Shepherds put on a most impressive demonstration and the crowd was most enthusiastic. The siren and the gunfire startled a couple of the horses but made the performance seem very real.

A little later in the afternoon, DENIS VIRI, one of the PHS Officers, introduced a little black mare and her foal, these being two of the horses that were rescued by the Society a couple of months ago. She had gained about 100 lbs., with a long way to go until she reaches her true weight. The foal, on the other hand, is fine. So the mare must have given everything she could to her baby. The audience was very sympathetic — seeing this mare in real life was far more touching than any newspaper picture ever was.

The art contest only had two entries, an oil of two horses by ROBIN HAWINGTON, which took first, and a nice pencil sketch by BETH FARRELL which was second. We'll hope for more of this same quality in the future. The BUD BARNES raffle was won by RONNIE HENRY of Los Altos and the etching by our Western Judge, DEBBIE BUGGE.

At the close of the day on Sunday, The High Point Blanket, so generously donated by the OLSEN NOLTE SADDLE SHOP was won by WENDY DANIELS on CANDY BAR with 42 Points.

And a special bit of candy on the cake was the fact that DON CARAWAY donated his services at the wheel of the water truck. We thank you one and all, for your help with a happy, successful show....


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
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Los Altos Hunt Hunter Trials


Consistently tying in every class she entered, Joan Collins on Small Talk picked up enough points to win Grand Champion, the spectacular Photo by David Wolfgang





I would like to thank the San Mateo County Horsemen for their generous gesture in support of the starving horses in our care. Mrs. W.A. Swinerton presented a check—the proceeds from the horse and pony show held this past weekend—to the Peninsula Humane Society Board of Directors yesterday morning and we are indeed grateful to all of the people who backed this magnificent benefit show.

I know you are interested in the condition and the future of these animals. The majority are recovering nicely although 3 or 4 yearlings have been permanently damaged and may not be saved. We think that 15 of the mares will foal within the next two months as a result of field breeding.

The cost of caring for these horses has been slightly more than \$5,000 to date. It looks as though they could be our responsibility for several more weeks since the owner's hearing is not scheduled until Oct. 17 and his trial will be scheduled after that. It seems very unlikely that we will recover any costs from the owner whether the judge finds him guilty or not.

In an effort to keep costs to a minimum we have moved several of the mares to private property where one of our animal control officers can care for them. They are being seen regularly by both a farrier and a veterinarian and it is certainly gratifying to see some of the more seriously neglected horses beginning to look like normal animals again.

The concern of the San Mateo Horsemen for the welfare of neglected animals, and your quick, positive action to help this cause, is appreciated more than I can say.

Manager of the amateur show was POLLY SWINERTON of Woodside, a lady of many talents, who was seen a few weeks later piloting her hunter mare "Lyn" around the course at the Los Altos Hunt Trials to cop the blue in the Ladies' Hunter Class. Then, of course, we could bring up the scope of her involvement in her pony project, but you'd never believe it all....

As a matter of fact, you would have to go far to match the talents of the formidable ladies who staff



all the great shows at the Patrol. The Secretary, for instance, of the aforementioned show was our own TIMMY GALLAGHER, who has been the treasurer of the SMCHA and is an expert on Western flora. She is the author of many delightful treatises on wild flowers and shrubs, etc., and also serves as a docent at Filoli, where she leads tours of that estate's lovely gardens and grounds.

Los Altos Hunt riders out with the hounds recently were startled by what could have been the dashing JENNY CHURCHILL galloping along with superb nonchalance side-saddle - except that the lady was blonde. Pennsylvania owner re-endorses papers back to California owner, puts horse on cross-country transport, and after three years and 6,000 miles a fine, honest little race-horse-turned-show-horse comes back to her overjoyed family.

ACT IV: (Long camera down into future) Young lady in Pennsylvania receives present from California. Crystal Reading (the mare) sends her first off-spring to Pennsylvania to grow up with the girl who loved her, and made her into the lovely animal she is today. THE END







Chili Beans Burgundy

 $\frac{1}{2}$ chopped onion

2 Tbsp. margarine or bacon drippings

½ lb. ground chuck

1-6 oz. can tomato paste

½ cup burgundy or claret

1-No. 2 can red kidney beans (drained)

Salt, onion salt and garlic salt to

1 Tbsp. grated parmesan

1 Tsp. Worchestershire

2 Tsp. chili powder

In a dutch oven, melt margarine, add ground chuck and cook, stirring with fork until meat loses its red color. Add chopped onion. Stir in tomato paste, then the wine. Add beans, cheese and seasonings; blend weel. Cover and simmer for 10 min. before serving. (4 servings)
