Minutes GENERAL MEETING

May 30, 1951

The meeting was called to order by the President, Bob Oleson.

The minutes of the April general meeting were read and approved.

The treasurer's report showed cash on hand \$3,255.67 and accounts recievable \$546.50.

Our correspondence consisted of an invitation to attend several shows, one in Santa Barbara, July 17-22, The Martinez show and Playday on June 16 and 17. The Yuba-Sutter Annual Show, June 9, and of local interest the Hidden Villa Horseplay Fiesta, June 10 at the Hidden Villa Ranch in Los Altos, also the Oakland Mounted Police Show, June 3rd.

Al Cryer showed the association a sample of the poster the membership committee is having made to advertise membership in our club.

Creed Haberlin reported that the contracts are being awarded for the building of the State trails.

Rosemary Lehman reported on our coming overnite ride, June 9-10 at the Native Sons Park. She reported that we will cater our own ride, with Ruth Oleson, Toots Lopez, and Rose Roy doing the honors. We will leave promptly at 9:30 A.M. from the Woodside Stables. The cost per member will be \$4.50, this includes lunch, dinner (barbecued chicken), breakfast, and lunch. The lodge is large enough to sleep all.

Rosemary also announced that our entertainment for the evening will be a question box with Janet and Bill doing the answering.

Bill Louew reported that our open show had 112 entries, 78 horses, and to date \$200.00 has been cleared. He thanked all those people who worked with him and made the show such a success.

Jerry Harwood reported on the Spring dance and said there was a good turnout and \$87.00 had been made so far.

Our Convention chairmen, Herb Huetigg and Rich Delucchi announced that 100 reservations have been made at the El Rancho Motel in Fresno. They asked that the reservations be sent in as soon as possible. Ed Zwierlein discussed the State trails further and told of the difficulty in obtaining barbed wire to match the fencing in the Spring Valley Lakes area.

He also announced that the Regional eleminations are to be held August 25-26 in Salinas. This year there will be a new class added, that is four horses showing under the same rules as pairs.

There will be a regional meeting, Friday the 29th of June at Ramor Oaks. Creed Haberlin offered to donate a trophy to be awarded to the largest showing group at the meeting.

Bev Ring told of the difficulty in obtaining the original shirts chosen by the association and a motion that the committee select the new shirts. The motion was seconded and carried.

Barbara Saylor announced the deadline for the Queen contest as June 9th. She urged the membership to support the girls.

Karl Hoffman explained the lateness of the magazine; he said as the new committee is getting the swing of things they had a few difficulties. He also told of the new column THE TRADING POST which the members may use to trade or sell any unused tack, etc.

Bob Oleson told of his idea to install a shooting gallery as our booth at the Rodeo.

As there was no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

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
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
