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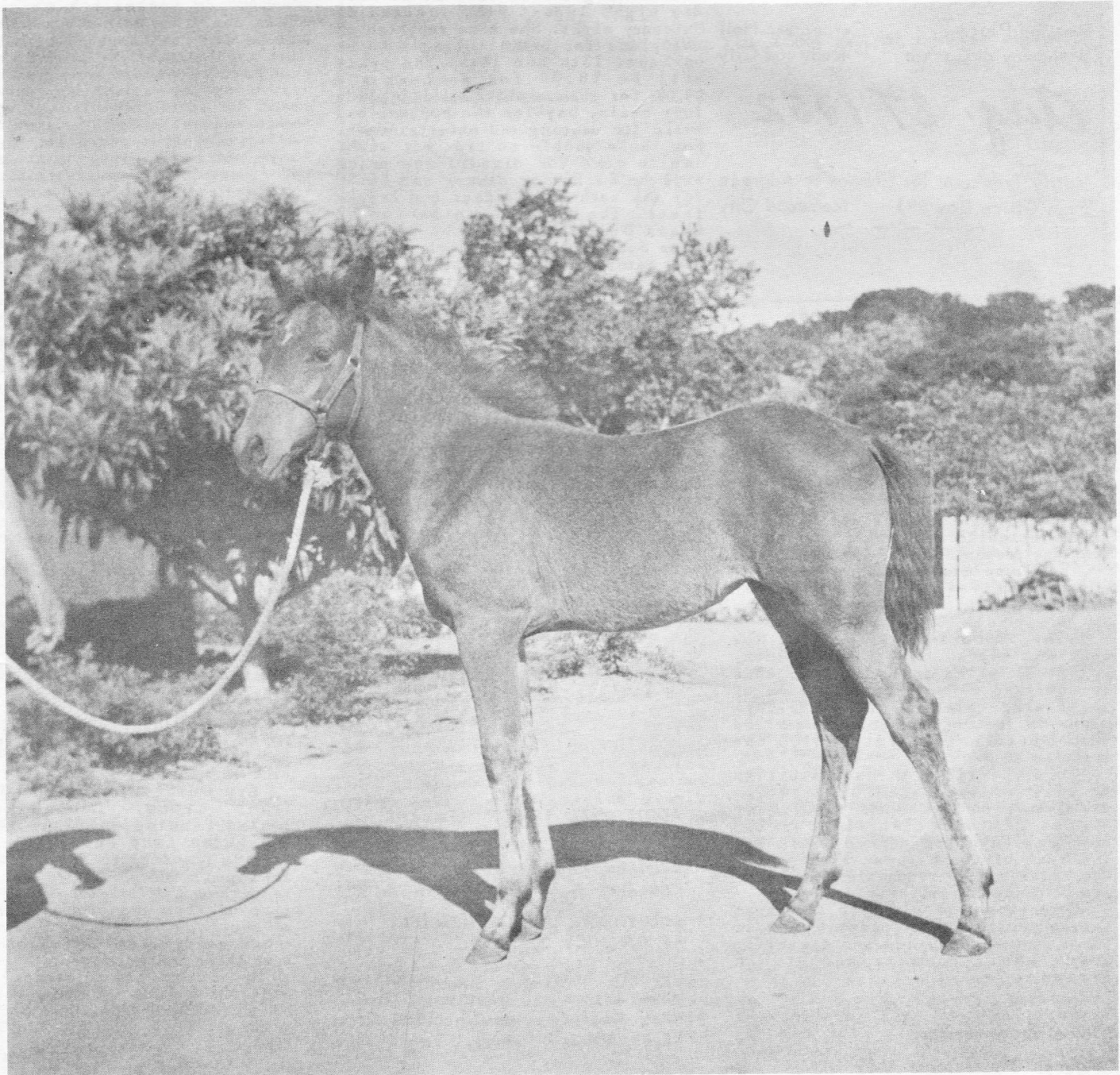

## WHO'S KIDDIN' WHO?

Horses and modern highway vehicles don't exactly mix. But there are plenty of high spirited mounts being ridden on highways, well traveled roads and in other areas where trucks, automobiles, busses and horses have to share the right of way. It's mighty important that the rider recognize the danger that these vehicles present to mount and man.

The human element at the wheel of a motor-driven vehicle, unfortunately, isn't as finely engineered as the piece of equipment he's driving. Motorists brag about how fast they can stop their automobiles, but at 60 miles an hour, 1/45 of a second (the normal reaction time of the average alert American driver) means 66 feet of possible danger and death before the driver hits the brake to stop.

It's the rider's responsibility to play it safe when he gets his horse out on the open road. Many horses get skittish when worked near engine noise, speed winds and the rest of the highway excitement. The rider has to recognize the danger and be ready for anything.

Horseowners should also recognize the danger that they present when in their own automobiles and traveling roads where equestrians are in evidence.

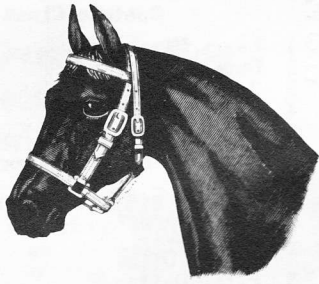

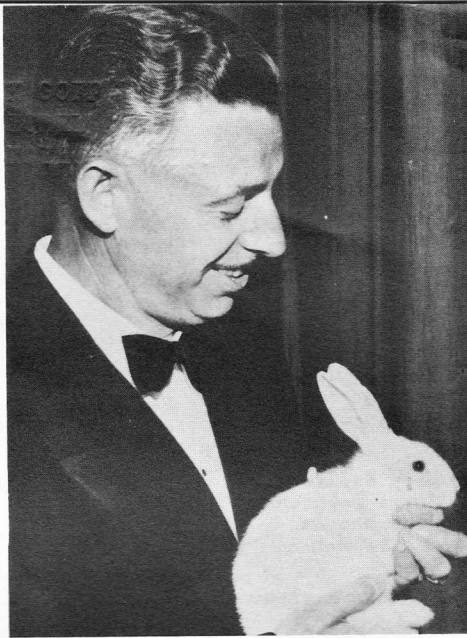
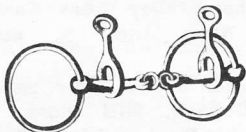

## IT'S MAGIC

## THE ART OF RIDING OR YOU TOO MAY BECOME A COWBOY

This article is written for the benefit of those horsemen who are so badly confused that they are not getting the maximum enjoyment out of this simple sport.

Now, I know that I am the best cowboy and horseman in San Mateo County. The first time I saw a horse was two years ago. Since that time, I have acquired a beautiful gelding (price \$25.00). I do not recommend paying over \$50.00 for any horse. When you get into the high-priced class of horses, \$100.00 and up, you may get a horse that has been spoiled by some professional trainer. Never have a veterinarian examine the horse you plan to buy. He may charge you \$10.00 or \$15.00 for the examination. This is outrageous - we know that no man can speak horse language, and for such a sum of money, you will be able to purchase a usable western saddle. True, the saddle-tree may be cracked or broken, but remember, the tree is covered with leather and cannot fall apart. Next, get the most severe speed-bit possible -- that always puts life in your horse and increases action. You are now ready to go on a trail ride.

I have gone on every trail ride to which I have been invited; however, I never go with the same group twice (that's because I am a gentleman, and, while I am usually considered the life of the party, I do not wish to show these people up twice as I am just naturally a modest person.) I will cite an example.

Last spring, I was invited to a day ride with the "Friendly Neighbors Riding Group". This group was composed of about 75 men, women and children (none of them good horsemen) Now, on the way to our rendezvous, I stopped at "Clancey's" and at "Murphy's" and had several boilermakers at each place. I also purchased a bottle of liquor to carry on the ride.

Now, this is important: At the rendezvous canter your horse in and out and around groups of waiting riders. This affords an excellent opportunity of demonstrating your real abilities. You will be able to note the expression of envy on the other riders' faces. At this point, I must give some important advice. *Do not pull all your tricks here. Wait until the ride starts.*

When you are on the trail, canter or gallop back and forth and between horses. Boy! If you want to have fun, just gallop up behind another horse. Some may shy and spook, while others may let fly with their rear feet (I'm a horseman). And remember! Always sip on your bottle until it is empty, then throw it on the trail.

I hope you have profited from this advice, and if you liked it, I will address you next time on the proper care of horses. *Believe me, I am the only expert in San Mateo County.*

In two years I have only injured 4 horses, 3 children, and 1 old lady.

3. How many coming for dinner and breakfast....

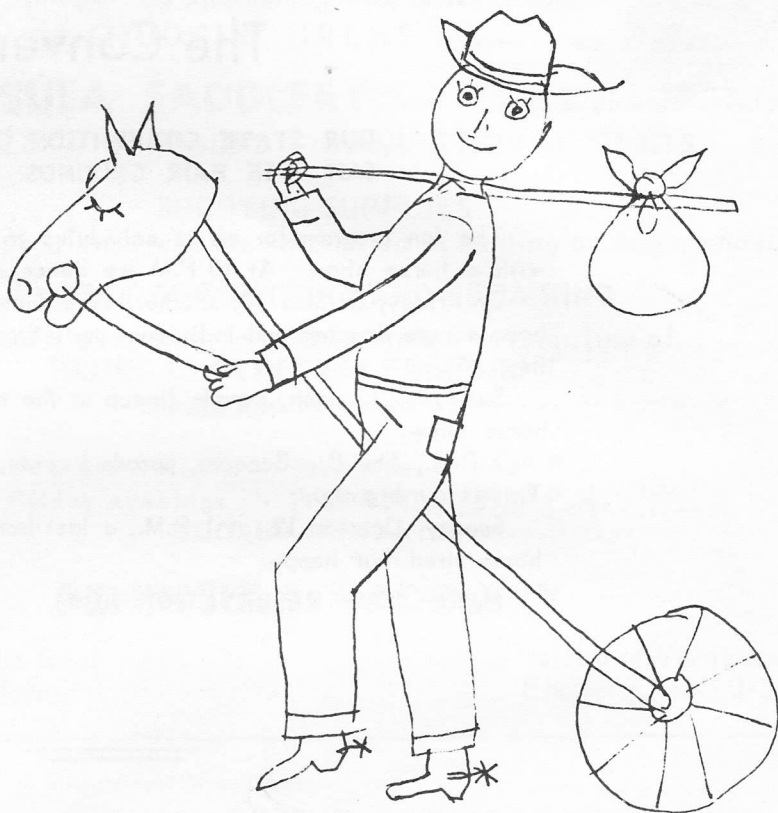
