


Adeline Forrest and Aleta Reed made up the other half of the food team. Everyone loved it as all the food sold out.



PRESERVING THE EQUESTRIAN LEGACY IN WOODSIDE

Restoration of the Folger Estate Stable

Two years ago, the Folger Stable committee began setting the stage for restoration of the nearly 100 year old stable The committee conducted a feasibility study to determine the cost of restoration and paid for an urgently needed roof repair over a portion of the stable building. The Committee's recent accomplishments have included the stable's listing in the National Register of Historic Places and participation as a liaison with the San Mateo County Parks & Recreation Department in the development of the Wunderlich Park master plan.

The Director of the National Parks Service in Washington DC announced that the "Folger Estate Stable Historic District" located in Wunderlich Park in Woodside was listed on the National Register of Historic Places on April 16, 2004. The protected structures within the Historic District include the main stable building,

the upper barn, the carriage house, the cold house, and the stone walls throughout. This action followed more than a year of preparation and an application prepared by architectural historian Michael Corbett.

The application was endorsed by the Parks and Recreation Division of the County of San Mateo, and coordinated by the Folger Estate Stable Committee of the Friends of Huddart & Wunderlich Parks. Mary Burns, Director of the Parks and Recreation Division of the

Environmental Services Agency of the County of San Mateo said, "I am thrilled that the Folger Stable Historic District has been placed on the National Register of Historic Places. It is important to have this type of recognition to ensure the success of the generous people who are working so hard to preserve this area for future generations."

The listing also had the written endorsement of community leaders and organizations including Bill Lane, Michael Svanevik and Shirley Burgett, San Mateo County Historical Association, San Mateo County Parks and Recreation Foundation, Mounted Patrol of San Mateo County, and the Rotary Club of Woodside-Portola Valley. Although the listing is an honor shared by approximately 50 other buildings in San Mateo County, the Folger Stable appears to be the first stable listed on the National Register in San Mateo County as part of an Historic District.

History

The Folger Estate and stable were built in 1905 by James A Folger II (1863-1921), son of the coffee pioneer, who took over his father's coffee business in San Francisco at the age of 26. According to a 1902 edition of the *Redwood City Democrat*, "Mr. Folger purchased the Jones' place, which is known to many through its sulphur springs, mountain drives and other things too numerous to mention." He married Clara Folger in 1899, and in 1905 they hired the firm of Schulze and Brown to develop the property as a country estate. Authur Brown Jr. would later design such buildings as the SF Opera House, SF City Hall, and parts of Filoli. The Folgers developed a palatial estate including buildings for horses, carriages, and automobiles.

It was under the Folger ownership that the focus of the activities on the land changed from purely agricultural to recreational. This was the era of the great estates on the Peninsula and many well known families would eventually build grand estates here, such as the Flood, Fleischhacker, and Bourne families.

The stable was likely built prior to the estate to house horses and animals needed to support the construction of the estate. The stable design is said to be derived from French Baroque architecture, which Brown had seen on a tour of Europe, and, to a lesser extent, from the Arts and Crafts Movement. The stable is a wooden frame structure built on a foundation of concrete footings and retaining walls of concrete and stone. The building is adorned with corbels under the eaves, paneled soffits, an arched main portico, and a balcony on the side of the building.

Visitors to the stable can see pieces of the pink marble baseboards that lined the walls, the three fireplaces that heated the building, and the radiators in the carriage room to keep the carriage wood dry. The entire stable is

made of redwood from trees harvested on the estate. Original bricks line the floor of the stable and the cast iron fenders designed to deflect the carriage wheels remain on the pillars in the porte cochere area. The square nails used in construction can be seen throughout the building.

After James Folger II died in 1921, his widow, Clara, remained in Woodside until her death in 1940. The land on which the stable is located was sold to Martin Wunderlich in 1956 and subsequently donated to the County of San Mateo in 1974.

Significantly, the stable still remains a stable! For over 33 years the stable has been leased by Pat Holmes who has maintained a horse boarding operation on the site, first leasing from Martin Wunderlich and subsequently from the County of San Mateo. She is working with the County and the Folger Estate Stable Committee to restore what she refers to as "this precious old stable."

Status of the Restoration Project

The Folger Estate Stable Committee, a committee of the Friends of Huddart &

Wunderlich Parks is working with the Parks and Recreation Division of the Environmental Services Agency, County of San Mateo to restore the stable to its original condition. The Folger Estate Stable Committee will recommend that after the restoration and the completion of the County's master plan for Huddart and Wunderlich Parks, supervised public access in the form of programming for children and adults can be instituted along with the continuation of horse boarding.

The Folger Estate Stable Committee's goals require for continued equestrian boarding facilities for 27 horses, new feed and tack rooms along with an enlarged hay storage are. The program also calls for a renovated office space, a display of antiques carriages, a memorabilia



display and a trophy case. Grooming and farrier areas and storage facilities along with the reconstruction of one "tie stall" as it would have functioned in the original barn are also planned. The public use program would

provide additional educational awareness aimed at integrating our unique mid-peninsula historic and precious equestrian heritage that is so important to this "Historic District" and San Mateo County.

Dig up the past and enhance the future!

Do you have photos, or memorabilia from the "good old days" at the Folger Stable? The Folger Estate Stable Committee is seeking help from the community in locating reminders of the Folger Stable in its earlier years (1905-1940) or equestrian memorabilia from the mid-peninsula from the same time. 


