

Ninth Year For Western Clinic

THE WESTERN RIDING CLINIC, sponsored by the San Mateo County Horsemen's Association and Mounted Patrol, will begin its ninth year of summer sessions with nine weekly Western Riding classes starting on Thursday, June 22, 1978.

These weekly classes are for both Junior and Senior SMCHA members, and will be held at the Mounted Patrol Grounds in Woodside. To enroll, go to the Announcer's Stand on the Patrol Grounds and present your SMCHA membership card (for new members who wish to enroll, SMCHA membership cards will be available at the stand); there will be a weekly nominal fee of one dollar. And, of course, bring a horse to ride - a mare or gelding.

Plans are to schedule four classes each evening to accommodate those students, both Junior and Senior, whose training needs range from Beginners through High Intermediates. Under professional class instruction, these classes in good horsemanship will emphasize the training of the rider. Juniors will meet from 5:00 to 6:15 p.m. and Seniors from 6:45 to 8:00 p.m.

Spectacular Trail Ride JUNE 25

The June ride (June 25) will provide an opportunity to ride from the head of Stevens Creek Canyon along the Canyon to Table Mountain at Charcoal Road and then on to Saratoga Gap for lunch. This ride is intended for conditioned horses and will be ridden at about 5 miles/hour. The trail out of Saratoga Gap and return is approximately 18 miles with a total climb of about 1,800 feet.

It will be necessary to trailer to the assembly point. Directions are given below. We will assemble at the large meadow on Skyline Blvd (see below) at 10:00 a.m. and be ready to ride at 10:30 a.m. Be sure to bring halters with lead ropes (and hobbles if desired). Windbreakers are recommended. Riders may wish to bring water for their horses for use upon return to the assembly point (there is good water along the trail).

From WOODSIDE area. Proceed via Woodside Rd (Rt 84) to Skyline

Price for lunch will be \$3.00 per Blvd (Rt 35). Turn south on Skyline and go 7.3 miles to Page Mill Road intersection. Continue south 0.6 miles on Skyline to LARGE OPEN MEADOW on left. Look for TRAIL RIBBONS ON GATE.

> From SARATOGA/LOS GATOS area. Proceed to SARATOGA GAP via Congress Springs Rd (Rt 9). TURN NORTH ON SKYLINE BLVD (Rt 35) and go 5.9 miles to LARGE MEADOW ON RIGHT. Look for TRAIL RIBBONS ON GATE.

From LOS ALTOS HILLS area. Proceed via PAGE MILL ROAD to Skyline Blvd (Rt 35) and turn south. Go 0.6 mile to LARGE MEADOW ON LEFT. OR for a more comfortable ride for horses and driver proceed to Woodside via Interstate 280, exit at Woodside Rd (Rt 84) and proceed as indicated for Woodside area.



'76 CAVALRY BRIGADE NEWS

On June 4, two weeks after this article is written and around the time you receive your SMCHA magazine, B troop will have ridden in the Ridea-Thon in Huddart Park. You have received your sponsor sheets in the newsletter and I hope you have your sponsors and have made the ride. Last year the Cavalry Brigade participated, movies were taken, and a scene was placed in our first motion picture film. This year the Brigade has helped sponsor the event, helping with the publicity, hosting the March of Dimes Poster Boy, Miguel Lopez, and helping with the chuck wagon lunch.





TRAINING WITH PSYCHOLOGY RIDING WITH AWARENESS


Respect for the intelligence of the horse will be the feature theme for two, one-month long courses in horse training and riding, August 1-25, and November 7-December 1, in Carmel, California.

Taught by internationally recognized horsewoman Linda Tellington-Jones, and assisted by Jim Forderer, the courses will be two clinics in one, a training clinic and a riding clinic. The clinics will be divided into four, five-day sessions, and participants may come for anywhere from one week to one month.

The training clinic will be for starting young horses, with Linda Tellington-Jones. Participants will start with an unridden horse and at trained, quiet, and safe mount. The clinic will cover a wide variety of subjects involved in training and handling horses, and will include riding lessons to develop a balanced seat, physical therapy for the horse and working with problem horses.


In addition to the training course there will be a riding program for those people interested in improving their riding and horse management skills. The riding program will be taught by Jim Forderer, a well known teacher, lecturer and judge.

ATTENTION: Saddle Seat Riders!

It's been two long years since saddle seat classes have been on the schedule of a San Mateo County Horsemen's Association English show, but September 16 will see the end of this particular drought.

Besides hunt seat classes, the schedule for the SMCHA Amateur/ Junior English Show will list 10-11 saddle seat classes, including equitation, pleasure and model mount. An award will be given to the high point saddle seat horse/ rider combination.

To encourage exhibitors to participate, a special "SMCHA Showmanship Award" will be presented to a saddle seat rider on the basis of: neatness, cleanliness and grooming of horse and rider; rider's personality and sportsmanship; and rider's ability to show his/her horse. The rider must enter at least two classes

(ribbons won will not be considered in making the award).

All you saddle seat riders mark September 16 on your calendar - this is one show you won't want to miss. SMCHA guarantees a good judge, nice awards, and the pleasant atmosphere of the Mounted Patrol Grounds in Woodside.

Oh yes, if only a few saddle seat riders enter this show, it will probably be the last SMCHA show with saddle seat classes. If a lot of you come, you make it possible for us to add even more saddle seat classes next year.
