The weather also cooperated for our Spring Ride this April. Cheryl Basin, SMCHA's 2nd Vice President and Ride Chairman, and her Ride Committee

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



EDGEWOOD COUNTY PARK CLARKIA TRAIL CLEAN-UP DAY

In July of 2000, the San Mateo County Horsemen's Association adopted the Clarkia Trail in Edgewood County Park. By adopting the trail, SMCHA agreed to take the responsibility of actively monitoring and maintaining this trail; with the supervision and direction of the San Mateo County Parks and Recreation Department.

Edgewood County Park and Natural Preserve is famous in the greater San Francisco Bay Area as a place to see fields of spring wildflowers, but the importance and meaning of the preserve to the horse community go well beyond viewing the wildflowers. Edgewood Park is one of the County parks that still remain accessible to equestrian and foot traffic only. No bicycles or dogs are allowed in Edgewood Park. The landscapes along the trails are beautiful and the views are breathtaking.


Our first clean-up day for the year was scheduled for April 22nd, but had to be canceled due to unpredictable weather. As many of you can still remember, we received a significant amount of rainfall during the month of April and the maintenance that needed to be done to the trail (i.e.: rerocking of the lower trail head) could not be performed at that time. So, after many discussions with the park rangers it was decided to cancel our first Clarkia Trail Clean-Up Day.

On June 10th, five volunteers and one park ranger met for our second clean-up day for the year. Our tasks for this maintenance day were to string cut the weeds along the trail and trim the bushes that were invading the path. Our crew came to work and we got the job completed in three hours! My husband, Al, Mike Bushue and Ranger Kevin spent the day using the weed-whackers to cut the weeds



along the entire Clarkia Trail; top to bottom! Adeline Forrest and I followed behind the guys with rakes to clear the debris that left from the weed-whacking; leaving behind a beautiful and well maintained trail! As the group rounded one of the bends in the trail, we ran into Rick Payne; who was busy trimming the overgrown bushes! Rick had started from the top of the trail and had been working his way down! He was definitely a welcomed sight and a pleasant surprise to us all!

Our next Clarkia Trail Clean-Up Day is scheduled for September 9th; so be on the lookout for flyers and e-mails! The clean-up days are actually a lot of fun, with a little hard work mixed in! One of the most memorable events of the fortnight (as the Brits say) was a trip to Exmoor in Somerset County. Exmoor is a huge national park on the west side of England. We stayed in a 1000 year old farm there called the Exmoor Falconry. We could both stable our horses there (or you could rent theirs) AND we got to fly the birds. Vivi would

stand on one side of the farm, and me on the other and the birds would fly between us. We wore big gloves so that we did not get scratched, as some of the birds were VERY big. We flew owls, falcons, hawks, buzzards and eagles. My favorite bird was named Dale. Dale was a Harris Hawk from California and very smart. At the end of the day they let us

take Dale out for a Hawk Walk in the forest. We let him loose and he either followed or led us down the creek bed, flying to us periodically for his treats. It was a wonderful day of learning all kinds of interesting things about birds. Did you know that birds descended from reptiles and are really just flying lizards in a way? Did you know they have a little hole under their tongues to be able to breathe while they are swallowing their meal? Did you know that the raptors (birds of prey) can't fly when they get wet? Their feathers are soft for silent flight, but get soggy when rained on.

Vivi and I each adopted one of the Harris Hawks before we left, covering their keep for the next year. I googled raptor experiences like this in North America, but not much available except in Vermont or British Columbia. So if you are even in England or Scotland, be sure to think of going riding where you can fly raptors and ride your horse between villages to the local pub. It will be the trip of a lifetime.

After a year of submitting proposals for the redevelopment of this land, the Planning Commission and the City Council both unanimously adopted the redevelopment proposal. It is only a matter of time before Bay Meadows Racecourse, as we know it, is no more.

Since the racetrack is loved by so many, the Bay Meadows Land Company has hired a real estate firm, Collier International, to identify a possible future site for the racecourse. Hopefully the efforts to retain the operations and the employees of Bay Meadows racecourse will be a reality; in a future not so far away! If Bay Meadows is still in its current state the same time next year, every effort will be made to host another "Friday Nite at the Races"; keep your fingers crossed!

She also understands how important it is for them to find second-chance careers once they've been retired from racing.

Of the nine horses currently under the care of Square Pegs, all but two are former thoroughbred racehorses. "Our most important partners at Square Pegs are our horses," Dunlap explains. "All of our horses have been donated after they could no longer compete due to injury or illness, which makes each of them unique and Square Peg in their own right." From the beautiful gelding, Red Power, who was retired from racing just last fall, to the elegant Classica who, after her racing career also competed among elite polo ponies in Palm Springs, their stories of success, failure and renewal helps connect the students to the horses on a personal level. "We use their stories as a meaningful link to our motto of "Everyone Fits"," adds Dunlap. "They are a vehicle to discuss diversity, second chances, physical ability and disability, and personal growth."



Consider Helicopter or Flight Insurance

A few years ago when Pat Dallam and I were riding a lot in the Sierras, we took out CalStar Air Rescue insurance. This group provides helicopter evacuation to the injured all over Central California. We first learned of it on the Tevis web site. It was so very reasonable in cost, that we considered it a no-brainer to sign up for it, and include our husbands. The current cost is \$40 for one person or \$45 for a family. See www.calstar.org or call 916.921.4094.

According to the American Trauma Society, trauma is the number one cause of death in the United States for persons under the age of 44. Trauma is defined as an acute personal wound or injury requiring immediate care. Between 140,000 and 160,000 trauma related deaths occur nationwide every year. For each death, at least two permanent disabilities occur, leading to a great loss of productivity and enormous disability costs.

The total annual cost of accidental death and disability in the United States is estimated to exceed \$110 billion. Despite the staggering loss of life, productivity and great cost to our society, trauma remains "the neglected disease". For trauma victims, medical treatment within one hour, often referred to as the "Golden Hour", can prevent 20-30 percent of potential deaths and dramatically reduce hospitalization times.

You always buy this sort of insurance and never think you will need it, then start wondering if you should drop it. On June 14, my horse slipped in Bort Meadows of Anthony Chabot Park and in one fell swoop justified my continued premium payments! I landed on my back, cracked my helmet, did a headstand and ended up in a face plant. Between my helmet and flak vest, I was pretty well padded, but still injured despite the precautions. Broken finger and lots of bruises keep me quiet even two weeks later. Thanks

to Martha Mikesell who called this incident in immediately (on the radio), two helicopters arrived within minutes and I was at the hospital within half an hour. Spent the night in Neurological ICU, then released next day.

While I have not gotten my bills yet, a mountain biker injured the same day on the road near where I did my acrobatics broke an arm and lost some teeth and had to be heli-lifted out. His bill was \$24,000 for the helicopter alone, and \$49,000 for the hospital. He did not have the flight insurance. I fully expect that CalStar will cover this flight, if not directly, through reciprocity, as Eden Hospital said that they bring in flights all the time to them.

Thanks to all of you like Martha who volunteer your time for trail patrols everywhere, and thanks to those on scene who helped my through this, both before and after. There was one fringe benefit of which I was not aware, but all of my lady friends advised me of after my return: apparently the flight EMTs look really great in their tight tee shirts and jeans!

For those of you who do extensive foreign travel such as my husband and I, AAA has a wonderful extension to their regular membership that will either fly you out of foreign countries, or fly someone in to care for you during medical emergencies. We have this coverage as well. Contact your local AAA office for more information on it.

Please consider CalStar or other flight insurance whether you ride a horse or just drive a car, depending on your individual needs. You never know when an accident or sudden illness could happen. And don't forget that helmet when you ride your horse! I would have had a totally different outcome without the helmet.

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

Pat was a champion of both horses and humans who served as a teacher, mentor and friend to a new generation of young horsemen and horsewomen, her friends said.

She is survived by her brother Greg; two nephews; and her friend and assistant Laura Stevens.
